Christopher M. Thomas, Class of 1968


In June, 2017, Christopher Thomas retired from the Michigan Department of State after 40 years of election administration service, including 36 years as Michigan's Director of Elections for both Democratic and Republican Secretaries of State. Following his graduation from SJHS in 1968, Thomas earned a B.A. in Political Science from Michigan State University, a M.A. in Urban Affairs from St. Louis University in St. Louis, MO, and a J.D. from Thomas Cooley Law School in Lansing.

While employed by the Michigan Secretary of State, Thomas administered Michigan election law, campaign finance act and lobbyist disclosure law. He also served as Secretary to the Board of State Canvassers. He administered the election law with 1,600 county, city and township clerks.

In 2013, President Barack Obama appointed Thomas as a Commissioner on the Presidential Commission on Election Administration, which made recommendations to improve the election day experience of America's voters.

Thomas is a founding member of the National Association of State Election Directors (NASED) and was elected NASED President in 1997 and again in 2013. He represented NASED on the Board of Advisors to the U.S. Election Assistance Commission from 2004 to 2017 and served as the Board Chair from 2006 to 2008. At the NASED Summer Conference in 2012, Thomas received the first NASED Distinguished Service Award.

Although retired, Thomas remains active in the world of elections as a Senior Advisor to Detroit City Clerk Janice Winfrey. He is a Fellow with the Bipartisan Policy Center, serves as a consultant with the Center for Secure and Modern Elections, and is a board member of the MIT Election Data and Science Lab and the U.S. Vote Foundation. He is currently helping to draft legislation to implement Proposal 2, an amendment to the Michigan Constitution adopted by the voters in 2022.



Kent Vanderberg, Class of 1979

Following his graduation in 1979, Kent Vanderberg earned a degree in Film and Video at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He then attended New York University before moving to London, where he became the number one video jock in the UK, entertaining at the Hippodrome.

After returning to the U.S., Vanderberg began a career in video production, as an ad agency producer, and started his own production company. In 1997 he moved his family to Florida to work with his clients including Walt Disney Parks & Resorts, National Geographic, Field Entertainment, MotoAmerica, PricewaterhouseCoopers, Hard Rock International, Disney Cruise Line and Disney Worldwide Conservation.

Vanderberg has directed Olympic Games, Pan American Games and Arab Games as well as directed for Tampa Bay Buccaneers football. He has produced videos for several countries and his video to "What the World Needs Now" was featured at the Democratic National Convention in 2016. Vanderberg has an Emmy Award as a live entertainment director. He continues to be active in community theatre.



Jeff Hoover, Class of 1984

As a performer in the SJHS variety shows, musicals, and school plays, Jeff Hoover's interest in performing arts was piqued. After his graduation in 1984, Hoover attended Western Michigan University where he continued his theatrical pursuits while also performing with the Twin City Players and Lakeshore Summer Theatre organizations. Jeff got his start on radio at WSJM/WIRX during his college summer breaks.

After moving to Chi cago in 1991, Hoover worked for a marketing company before becoming a writer and producer for the Jonathon Brandmeier radio show program. On the show he showcased his art of imitating celebrity voices. During his years in Chicago, Jeff performed improv at Second City, performed a children's show on the Main Stage, and co-founded the WNEP Theater, a company that builds on improvisation and sketch techniques to create plays and other theatrical experiences.

Since 2003 Jeff Hoover has been the Emmy Award winning producer of Chicago's #1 rated WGN Morning News program. His retrospective, "Bozo, Gar & Ray: WGN-TV Classics," earned Jeff a Telly Award in 2005. Each Monday, Jeff has a segment on the show called "And Now For Something Completely Hoover." Two of his sketches were modified for St. Joseph Public School Foundation's ENCORE productions.

Besides being an integral part of all four ENCORE productions, Jeff's volunteering also includes The Greater Illinois Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, Gilda's Club Chicago for cancer support, and producing annual food and toy drives for WGN-TV.
